Blwyddyn fawr Cymdeithas Cerdd Dant Cymru

Mae 2009 yn flwyddyn fawr i Gymdeithas Cerdd Dant Cymru – yn flwyddyn o ddatlu ei phenblwydd yn 75 oed. Maen nhw'n nodi'r garreg filltir hon gyda sawl digwyddiad yn ystod y flwyddyn, gan gynnwys y perfformiad yn Aberystwyth ddiwedd Mehefin o 'Dan y Wenallt' wedi ei osod ar gerdd dant gan Bethan Bryn. Bydd cyfle arall i weld rhannau o 'Dan y Wenallt' yn cael ei pherfformio yn ystod wythnos yr Eisteddfod Genedlaethol.

Mae eleni hefyd yn flwyddyn o newidiadau o safbwynt gweinyddiaeth y Gymdeithas. Mae'r trefnydd profiadol, Dewi Jones yn parhau i fod yng ngofal uchafbwynt blynyddol y calendr Cerdd Dant, sef yr Wyl Gerdd Dant. Mae'r trefniadau yn mynd rhagddynt ar gyfer gwyl eleni fydd yn cael ei chynnal yng Nghasnewydd ar ddydd Sadwrn, Tachwedd y 14eg. Ond mae'r Gymdeithas hefyd yn croesawu aelod newydd i'r tîm sef Swyddog Gweinyddol newydd, Siôn Gwilym Jones. Mae Siôn newydd gwblhau gradd mewn Peirianneg ym Mhrifysgol King's yng Nghaergrawnt, ac wedi dychwelyd i'w wreiddiau yn Llansadwrn ar Ynys Môn. Mae ganddo ddiddordeb mawr yn nhraddodiadau gwerin Cymru, ac yn mynd i fod yn gofalu am waith y Gymdeithas o ddydd i ddydd.

Cadeirydd newydd Clera

Mae Clera yn edrych ymlaen at y flwyddyn o'n blaenau gyda Chadeirydd newydd, yn dilyn eu Cyfarfod Blynyddol yng Nghorwen. Bydd Stephen Rees yn olynu Robin Huw Bowen. Yn y cyfarfod hefyd fe benodwyd Ysgrifennydd newydd, Elin Roberts, sydd newydd raddio o Goleg Prifysgol Cymru, Aberystwyth.

Yn dilyn y cyfarfod cafwyd cyngerdd arall gan y Glerorfa o flaen cynulleidfa frwd. Ynghynt, yn y Cyfarfod Blynyddol, roedd y trefnydd Arfon Gwilym wedi atgoffa pawb cymaint o ddatblygu a fu ers ychydig dros ddwy flynedd – un cyngerdd yn 2006, un yn 2007, pump yn 2008 (gan gynnwys tri yn An Oriant) a chwech eleni. Un o'r uchafbwyntiau eleni fydd ymddangosiad yng nghyngerdd agoriadol Eisteddfod Genedlaethol Y Bala ar Orffennaf 31, cyngerdd a ddarlledir yn fyw ar S4C.

Cyngerdd mawr arall eleni oedd yr un yn Galeri, Caernarfon, ym mis Ebrill. Cafodd ei recordio gan gwmni Sain a'r canlyniad fydd cryno ddisg a gyhoeddir yn Eisteddfod Y Bala ar ddydd Sadwrn, Awst 1af, mewn tri perfformiad: yn Nhŷ Gwerin, ar Lwyfan Sain ac yn y Pafiliwn Dawns. Bydd y cyngerdd olaf eleni ym Mangor ar Hydref 10 – cyngerdd cyhoeddi Gŵyl Cerdd Dant 2010.

Yn y Cyfarfod Blynyddol trafodwyd y pwysigrwydd o gadw cydbwysedd iawn rhwng gweithgareddau'r Glerorfa – sy'n amlwg yn dwyn llawer o amser – a threfnu gweithdai, sy'n allweddol i gynnal y twf a'r momentwm. Bydd rhaglen gyflawn o weithdai yn digwydd yn 2010. Yn y cyfamser, bydd y Gweithdy nesaf gan Clera yn Amgueddfa Sain Ffagan ar Fedi 19.



New Chair for Clera

Clera are looking forward to the year ahead with a new Chairman, after their AGM at Corwen. Stephen Rees will take over the Chair from Robin Huw Bowen. At the meeting, a new Secretary was also appointed: Elin Roberts, who has just graduated from University of Wales, Aberystwyth.

The meeting was followed by another Clerofa concert in front of an enthusiastic audience. Earlier, at the AGM, Clerofa organiser Arfon Gwilym had reminded members how far they had come in just over two years: one concert in 2006, one in 2007, five in 2008 (including three in Lorient) and six this year. One of the highlights will be an appearance at the opening concert of the National Eisteddfod in Bala on July 31, to be broadcast live on S4C.

Another major concert this year was the performance at Galeri, Caernarfon, in April which was recorded by Sain. The result will be a CD which will be released at the National Eisteddfod – three separate events on the Maes on Saturday, August 1st, in Tŷ Gwerin, the Sain stage and the dance pavilion. The final concert of 2009 will be in Bangor on October 10 – a concert to publicise the 2010 Gŵyl Cerdd Dant.

A full programme of workshops will take place in 2010. Meanwhile, the next Clera workshop will be in St Fagans National History Museum on September 19.

There will be another opportunity to see parts of 'Under Milk Wood' being performed during National Eisteddfod week.

This year is also one of changes in the Society's administration. Organiser Dewi Jones remains in charge of the annual high point of the Cerdd Dant calendar - the Cerdd Dant Festival - and arrangements are well in hand for this year's festival which will be held in Newport on Saturday, November 14th. Another first, and this time it's at the Meirion & District National Eisteddfod. Visitors to this year's festival at Bala, from 1st to 8th of August, will be able to sample a range of traditional Welsh musical experiences under one roof at the new “Tŷ Gwerin” tent.

trac's co-ordinating a central location for Wales' music traditions on the Eisteddfod field, and is delighted that a range of partners will be joining us.

In one huge tent, you'll be able to meet Tŷ Cerdd and Live Music Now; the Cerdd Dant Society and the Cerdd Dant Festival; the traditional instruments society Clera; the Welsh Folk Song Society, Voluntary Arts Wales; and of course staff and board members of trac.

There'll be a dedicated space within the tent for workshops and live music. Other possibilities include clogging workshops, fiddle workshops, plus a chance to sing Plygain songs and summer carols.

There'll be delights throughout the week, including music from Clera's fifty-strong folk orchestra the Clerorfa, launching their debut CD on Saturday 1 August at 11.00 a.m.

Would you like to offer a workshop or demonstration? Get in touch with trac and we'll see what we can do. Storytellers, too, are invited.

At four o'clock every day there'll be an open session for musicians of all abilities. Instrumentalists, remember to bring your gear with you. Singers, we'll have song sheets. The perfect end to an Eisteddfod day.

As usual, we'll be producing a programme giving details of all these, plus other folk and traditional events around the field. Copies will be available free; get yours early and plan a week of traditional music. No excuses!

The current proposals take on board many of the comments made by the Class of '08. We intend to keep the three day format, probably on the same weekend (depending on the availability of our special guest tutor) – this year, that would be the evening of Thursday October 29th to the

afternoon of Sunday November 1st.

We have a 'pencil booking' at the brand spanking new Margam Discovery Centre, Margam Park, Port Talbot. What a fantastic place: lovely walks, an Orangery, deer park, and great views, it's the newest of the UK Field Studies Council centres and incorporates any number of 'green' principles. We're intending to stick to the principle of ensemble work, with Experimenters sorted according to ability and interests, but we're working in opportunities for instrumentalists to do more singing. We'll announce the tutors at a later date, but rest assured they will be Quality all the way!

We also propose special opportunities for more advanced players and support for those who are just getting to grips with session playing.

And we're currently working on ways to get information out in advance – not just registration details but also tunes and songs – so that Experimenters can hit the ground running.

trac already has three 'Dryw Bach' little harps made by Telynau Teifi, which are also available for harp-teachers to hire for events where they can offer 'have a go on a harp' sessions.

Harpist Bethan Nia has tried this out at various public events and tells how there is always a lot of interest from the public. Most recently she and the little harps were invited back to Caerphilly Castle to take part in this year's Adult Learners Week after the popularity of her visit last May.

The first *Distil Cymru*

February saw another first for Wales' burgeoning traditional music scene.

This specialist course is introduced here by one of its founders, David Francis



Distil was set up by two musicians and traditional arts activists, Simon Thoumire and David Francis, who recognised that there was a growing number of adventurously inclined musicians from the traditional music community who were writing and performing new music, often collaborating with musicians from other disciplines. Distil was conceived as a space for creative development for professional, tradition-based musicians who wished to acquire new skills, spend time with like-minded musicians, and reflect on their work.

We work with traditional musicians because that's the community we come from, and because we believe that traditional musicians have unique cultural connections to the past, to place, and to a way of understanding music which derives from community and communal memory. Distil mixes traditional musicians (some of them conservatory trained, and all of whom have reached a high level in their own field) with mentors who work in areas of music which have an energy that complements the energy of traditional music – be it contemporary classical music, free improvisation, or modern expressions of traditional music from cultures originating outside the British Isles.

The outcome from Distil we hope for is new work by traditional musicians which takes account of musical possibilities from outside traditional music. We want to be clear, however, that our hope is that this new work will represent a distillation of ideas from a dialogue between musicians, not a dilution of traditional music itself. If music in general is to be enriched by traditional music, then, as Hamish Henderson put it, 'pedigree traditional stock must still be bred for the hybridisation'. We also hope that the other musicians will gain from the exchange with British traditional musicians.

With all that in mind, the first Distil Cymru took place over four intensive days in February at the Trigonos Centre in Snowdonia, where seven participants - Dylan Fowler, Gwenan Gibbard, Stephen Rees, Angharad Jenkins, Delyth Jenkins, Gerard KilBride, Christine Cooper - worked with three tutors/mentors, composers Karen Wimhurst and Kuljit Bhamra, and improviser Paul Rogers. The sessions comprised group-work and talks, and one to one sessions (each participant has a one-to-one with each of the tutors). People brought completed work, work in progress and even just the kernel of ideas to share and develop. 'An experience that will stay with me

for a long time – it was great to share in that energy, understanding, encouragement and expertise!' was just one response from the musicians who took part.

A second Distil residential of this first pilot year is planned for September. There are places available and you can apply by dropping a line to info@distil.org.uk telling us about your music and how you think Distil could help to develop it.

Distil Cymru was set up with the full support of Arts Council Wales, and the Performing Rights Society Foundation.

Distil was inspiring, challenging, thought-provoking, energising, relaxing and a thoroughly enjoyable weekend. It is about pushing boundaries and creating new music within a traditional setting, whilst embracing the qualities of every musical genre. Together, we created exciting new music which I never thought would be possible in such a short amount of time. I can't recommend the course enough!

Tŷ a Gardd

trac's three year project reaches its conclusion

After three years of project work across Wales, trac's 'Tŷ a Gardd' programme of community-based workshops and projects has now closed.

Tŷ a Gardd has backed tune clubs and song sessions and instrumental workshops, and taken folk songs into primary schools and playing-by-ear and songwriting skills to high schools; it's commissioned a folk opera, taught Plygain carols and Mari Lwyd traditions and brought guests from the Celtic world to

share their knowledge of traditional folk music.

With funding from the Arts Council of Wales, it's also enabled trac to create partnerships with local councils, Mentrau Iaith and a host of hardworking folk activists and organisers around the country.

New projects will be off the ground soon in 2009, but meanwhile here's a round-up of some of the last of the Tŷ a Gardd activities.

Unplygged

As this year's Plygain season came to an end, trac had the opportunity to support workshops which brought traditional Plygain singers together with professional singers to share their experience. Parti Pen Llan (Llansilyn), Mair Thomas (Llanfyllin) and Parti Blewyn Glas (Llanfair Caereinion) worked with Brigyn, Gareth Bonello, 9 Bach, Lleuwen Steffan, Jeb Loy Nichols, and Katell Keineg. The sessions were organised by Rhys Mwyn and many of the participants went on to take part in a performance on January 16, broadcast by S4C and BBC Radio Cymru. "*Noson i'w drysori*" (a night to treasure) in the words of Lleuwen Steffan. Several of the artists involved intend to work together again.

You Tunes

Dolanog Tune Club maestro Gary Northeast has recorded a series of traditional Welsh tunes to take his accessible teaching style to a global public via YouTube. Six well-known Welsh session tunes have been filmed with a view to making the repertoire better known, and will be available to view very soon.

The Tŷ a Gardd project also paid for the filming of Delyth Jenkins playing ten traditional Welsh tunes on the harp. Beautifully filmed as part of her work for trac at Ystradgynlais, the videos take the viewer through a simple single-note version of each melody, then follow on with the tune played in full on the harp.

Gwenno Dafydd's 'Songs Of Our Nation' strand of the project saw schools in the Cardiff area introduced to a range of traditional songs in time for St David's Day. As a legacy, teachers can access videos of Gwenno teaching the songs via the schools' equivalent of YouTube, plus they'll be available soon on trac's page at www.youtube.com/musictraditionsales

For those not used to YouTube, it's a website which makes short videos available on your computer, free of charge, to anyone with broadband internet access.

May Carols

Singers in Aberystwyth and Cardiff gathered to learn the tradition of singing special Welsh songs to welcome in the summer, pictured on our front cover. Dr Rhiannon Ifans, author of a book on the subject, *Sêrs a Ribana*, taught two workshops where four-part harmonies combined with the decorating of the May Branch of birch wood to give a wholistic view of a neglected tradition.

“ Very Well-a-Done... ”

*Ar y ffordd wrth fynd i Rymni,
Very well-a-done Jim Cro,
Cwrddydd wnes â dyn a mwnci,
Very well-a-done Jim Cro;
Yn dod adre'n lled anhwylyd,
Very well-a-done Jim Cro;
Wedi wado naw o Badis,
Victoria, Victoria,
Very well-a-done Jim Cro.*

Dyma eiriau cân draddodiadol Gymraeg boblogaidd sy'n un o ddarnau prawf Eisteddfod Genedlaethol Glyn Ebwy 2010.

Yn ôl Phyllis Kinney a Meredydd Evans yn *Canu'r Cymry II*, cafodd yr alaw hon, sy'n fersiwn o 'Hob y Deri Dando', a'r pennill eu hanfon i Eisteddfod Bae Colwyn ym 1910. Mae'n bur debyg bod y cystadleuydd yn hannu o Dde Orllewin Cymru, er bod y gân yn sôn am ddigwyddiad ger y Rhymni.

I'r canwr cyffredin y byrdwn sy'n drawiadol, ac yn cael ei esbonio fel darn o ddwli sy'n atsain o sioeau'r clêr y 19^{eg} ganrif. Gan bod "Jim Cro" yn ymddangos mewn o leiaf tair cân werin Gymraeg, mae'n werth ei hastudio'n agosach.

Priodolir creu cymeriad Jim Cro i'r perfformiwr wyneb-ddu Thomas "Daddy" Rice tua 1828, wedi iddo weld bonheddwr croenddu hŷn yn dawnsio ac yn canu:

*"Weel about and turn about and do jis so,
Eb'ry time I weel about I jump Jim Crow."*

Tyfodd "Jump Jim Crow", cân a ysgrifennwyd ac a berfformiwyd gan Rice i fod yn un o ganeuon mwyaf poblogaidd y 19^{eg} ganrif ac yn gonglfaen o'r hyn a dyfodd yn ffenomenon Sioe y Clêr. Yn ddiau roedd y gân, ac eraill a esgorodd arni, yn ymgais gan bobl gwyn i wneud hwyl am draddodiadau dawns Affricanaidd-Americanau, lle y mae symudiadau adar ac anifeiliaid yn cael eu hail-greu.

Mae hynny'n esbonio tarddiad "Jim Cro" ond beth am "Victoria, Victoria, very well-a-done"?

Mewn trafodaeth ddiweddar ar y Mudcat Café¹, grwp trafod cerddoriaeth werin ar y we, daeth y cefndir diddorol canlynol i'r amlwg.

Yn *The Voyager's Companion and Adviser* gan Henry John Webber (1885), cafodd yr un byrdwn ei ddyfynu o sianti "wladgarol iawn", ac yn y 1920au, casglodd

JM Carpenter, y llên-gwerinwr o Americanwr y sianti "Victorio", a oedd yn dwyn y teitl amgen "Very Well Done Jim Crow" oddiwrth dri chanwr o'r Alban.

Roedd Victorio yn bennaeth enwog ar yr Apache (T'Inde), cydymaith Cochise a Geronimo, yn ystod rhyfeloedd yr Apache yn America. Cafodd ei bobl eu hurddio'n ddi-drugaredd o'u tiroedd traddodiadol, eu newynu a hyd yn oed eu hela am fownti a phleser. Dihangodd Victorio a'i ddynion o'u rhandiroedd ym Mecsico Newydd ac ymgyrchu'n ffyrnig yn erbyn byddin America ar draws Mecsico Newydd ac Arizona yn ystod 1879 a 1880.

Daeth dechrau'r diwedd yn Rattlesnake Springs, Tecsas ar Awst 6, 1880. Tra'n chwilio am ddŵr glân, cuddymosodwyd ar Victorio a'i ddynion gan ddau Gwmni o Ddegfed Cafalri'r Unol Daleithiau. Rhain oedd "Milwyr y Buffalo", cwmnïau o gyn-gaethweision a oedd am wella'u byd a chael eu derbyn i brif lif y gymdeithas yn America, ac a ffurfiwyd yn sgil y Rhyfel Cartref. Mae'n eironi trist bod yr Americanwyr gwyn wedi defnyddio'r milwyr Affricanaidd-Americanau hyn fel sgowtiaid yn eu hymgyrchoedd milain yn erbyn pobl brodorol Gogledd America.

Felly mae'n ddigon posibl bod "Victorio, Victorio, very well done, Jim Crow" wir yn sianti "wladgarol", yn dathlu cyfraniad Milwyr y Buffalo at y rhyfel – er yn sicrhau yn y broses bod y deyrnged yn cadw'i flas o hiliaeth.

Gan bod yr erthygl hon wedi cychwyn gan gyfeirio at Eisteddfod Glyn Ebwy y flwyddyn nesaf, gadewch i ni hefyd sôn am Dŷ Jim Cro, Croesyceiliog, Cwmbran. Er i Wasanaeth Archif Gwent² ymdrechu'n ddiwyd ar ran Ontrac, mae manylion yr enw'n aros yn dywyll. Cafodd ei gynnwys ar fap am y tro cyntaf yn 1851; mewn erthygl yn 1968 yn y cylchgrawn "Presenting Monmouthshire", dywedodd yr hanesydd F.J. Hando taw 'morwr o Loegr' oedd Jim Cro a'i fod yn ffrind i deulu preswyl yr Ifansiad.

Efallai nad oes unrhyw gysylltiad rhwng y Jim Cro hwn a'r gân neu'r sianti; mae'n amlwg bod yr amseru'n anghywir. Efallai bod dyddiadau gorchfygu Victorio gan filwyr Jim Cro yn 1880 a'r casgliad o ganeuon a gyflwynwyd i Eisteddfod Bae Colwyn yn 1910 ond braidd yn cyd-fynd. Ac yn sicr nid ydym wedi cyffwrdd â "het Jim Cro" a drysorwyd gan ddyweddi Gwenno Pengelli, neu Jim Cro Crystyn anrhifog "Dacw Mam yn Dwad" – ond cawn ddychwelyd at y rheini y tro nesaf efallai!

*Ar y ffordd wrth fynd i Rymni,
Very well-a-done Jim Cro,
Cwrddyd wnes â dyn a mwnci,
Very well-a-done Jim Cro . . .
Victoria, Victoria,
Very well-a-done Jim Cro.*

Thus goes a popular Welsh traditional song, one of the set pieces for the 2010 National Eisteddfod at Ebbw Vale.

According to Phyllis Kinney and Meredydd Evans in *Canu'r Cymry II*, this tune, a version of 'Hob y Deri Dando', and verse were sent to "the Colwyn Bay Eisteddfod of 1910. The competitor probably came from Southwest Wales," although the song describes an event near Rymni.

To the casual singer, it's the refrain that stands out, generally explained as a bit of nonsense harkening back to minstrel shows of the 19th century. As "Jim Crow" appears in at least three Welsh folk songs, it's worth taking a closer look.

Black-face performer Thomas "Daddy" Rice is credited with creating the Jim Crow caricature around 1828 having seen an elderly black gentleman dancing and singing:

*"Weel about and turn about and do jis so,
Eb'ry time I weel about I jump Jim Crow."*

"Jump Jim Crow", written and performed by Rice, went on to become a 19th century hit and a cornerstone of what grew into the Minstrel Show phenomenon. The song, and its progeny, are undeniably a white mockery of bona fide African-American dance traditions in which bird and animal movements are re-enacted.

That explains the roots of "Jim Crow" but what of "Victoria, Victoria, very well-a-done"? A recent discussion on the Mudcat Café¹, an internet folk music discussion group, brought some interesting background to light.

In *The Voyager's Companion and Adviser* by Henry John Webber (1885) this same chorus was quoted from a "highly patriotic" chantey and in the 1920s, the American folklorist JM Carpenter collected the chantey, "Victorio",

i'd like you to know

"Very Well-a-Done ..."

from three Scottish singers with the alternative title, "Very Well Done Jim Crow".

Victorio was a famous Apache (T'Inde) chief, ally of Cochise and Geronimo, during America's Apache Wars. His people were notoriously herded from traditional lands, starved, and even hunted for bounty and pleasure. Victorio and his men escaped from their New Mexico reservation and, from 1879 to 1880, waged a bloody campaign against the US army across New Mexico and Arizona.

The beginning of his end came at Rattlesnake Springs, Texas on August 6, 1880. Seeking fresh water, Victorio and his men were ambushed by two Companies of the Tenth US Cavalry. These were the "Buffalo Soldiers", companies formed in the aftermath of the American Civil War made up of former slaves looking to better themselves and become accepted into mainstream American society. It is sadly ironic that white America then used these African-American troupes as scouts in the oppressive campaigns against North American native people.

So, it could be that "Victorio, Victorio, very well done, Jim Crow" was indeed a "patriotic" chantey celebrating the Buffalo Soldiers' contribution to the war effort – although ensuring that the compliment retained a taste of racism in the process.

As this article began with a reference to next year's Ebbw Vale Eisteddfod, let us mention in passing Jim Crow House, Croesyceiliog, Cwmbran. Despite substantial effort by the Gwent Archive Service² on Ontrac's behalf, details of the name are sketchy. It was first mapped in 1851; in a 1968 article in "Presenting Monmouthshire" historian F.J. Hando reported that the name Jim Crow was that of a "seafaring man out of England" who was a friend of the resident Evans family.

Perhaps there's no connection between that Jim Crow and the song, or the chantey; the timing is obviously wrong. Perhaps the dates of Victorio's defeat by the Jim Crow soldiers in 1880 and the collection of songs submitted in Colwyn Bay in 1910 just barely fit. And definitely we haven't even touched upon the "Jim Crow hat" treasured by Gwenno Penygelli's fiancé, or the innumerate Jim Cro Crystyn of "Dacw Mam yn Dwad" – but we'll leave that for another time, shall we?
